Eponyms


- 3000 30000 Eponyms
- Anthroponyms: Fallopian tube, Bartholin's gland, Bernard Soulier syndrome
- Toponyms: Haemoglobin G_{Philadelphia}, Hemoglobin Tak, Lyme borreliosis
- Bakronyms: Apgar score (Appearance, Pulse, Grimace, Activity, and Respiration)
- Mythonyms: terms motivated by Greek mythology




Greek Mythology

Introduction

- The study of "Myths"—and myths are stories about supernatural beings in early times, which were handed down orally from one generation to another.
- Myths attempt to explain such things as:
 - Nature- Where did Earth come from? Heavens? Seasons? Geography?
 - Man- Where did we come from?
 - Gods- Where do the gods come from?

Apollo


Greek Apollo, Latin Apollo

- Symbols : Swan, Laurel






Greek Asklepios, Latin Aesculapius

- Rod of Asclepius




The Star of Life

Asclepius with his serpent-entwined staff, Archaeological Museum of Epidaurus








Mercurius by Artus Quellinus the Elder




Odysseus journeying home After the Trojan war 10 years




